



Believe: Generosity Theology



What you believe regarding money and generosity is the foundation of your financial ministry. It is important, then, to take a close look at what the Bible teaches about money and consider how it forms a theology of giving in your church.

Below is a sampling of different biblical teachings related to money and generosity. It certainly is not exhaustive, but it is a great start.

Follow the steps below to begin crafting your Generosity Theology.

1. Preview the list below.

1. God owns it all. Psalm 24:1
2. God is a generous God. Matthew 7:11
3. Generosity is the path to the best life possible. 1 Timothy 6:19
4. God is my provider. Genesis 22:13-14
5. Generosity blesses me. 2 Corinthians 9:8

8. Generosity is joy-filled. 2 Corinthians 8:2
9. Always be ready to give. 2 Corinthians 9:2-3

12. Generosity blesses others. Acts 20:35
13. Money is to be enjoyed. 1 Timothy 6:17
14. Generosity is a reflection of God. Proverbs 19:17
15. God alone gives wealth. Deuteronomy 8:18
16. God gives both seasons of wealth and poverty. 1 Samuel 2:7
17. We will experience success, failure, and grace as we practice generosity. Genesis 4:1-6
18. You do not lose when you give. Proverbs 11:24
19. Your business can be blessed. Proverbs 11:26
20. Giving, prayer, and fasting are connected. Matthew 6:1-21
21. Leaders lead first with generosity. 1 Chronicles 29:1-9

2. Select foundational theology points for your church's theology of generosity.

You need to craft 4-5 foundational theology points along with a key passage for each on which you will anchor your life and ministry. While you may teach on everything that God's Word says about generosity and finances, it is important to have a few key values that you and your staff can memorize, internalize, and repeat easily.

Take the time to select the top 4–5 biblical teachings from the list above that you are most passionate about. At this point, simply be descriptive in your language as you will refine these phrases in a future exercise. Avoid making each axiom too broad or general and include one key supporting Bible passage for each.

Example: The blessings of generosity are for everyone; all ages, maturity levels, and incomes. John 6:1-14 describes a story where generosity involved everyone and blessed many. It involved Jesus, the young boy, the masses of people, and the disciples. In the beginning, the boy provides the gift. In the end, the disciples distribute much while collecting 12 baskets of leftovers. Jesus was involved as the miraculous multiplier. The key summary verse is John 6:9 "There's a boy here who has five barley loaves and two fish—but what are they for so many?" CSB

3. Apply filters to your list.

Sifting your phrases through the following filters will help insure you have enough breadth to lead across all platforms.

1. Am I personally passionate about each of these? Leading from strong belief and passion will increase the likelihood of success and breed confidence.
2. Have I provided one clear biblical passage for each that clearly speaks to this truth?
3. Am I speaking in terms of grace, growth, promise, and hope like the Bible does? Avoid terms that are negative, guilt-ridden, and obligation oriented.
4. Have I included a biblical teaching that will help me lead in the areas of personal application, staff leadership, and church financial decision making?
5. Do I have one for everyone? Is any one person or ministry left out? Think of young and old, single and married, wealthy and poor.

4. Craft your phases in a way that will help you lead.

Before you begin refining your phrases, consider the following direction:

Be positive. God leads with love. His Holy Spirit will decide when conviction is necessary.

Be clear and concise. Just say it. Don't get so cute it loses meaning.

Be biblical. God's Word is powerful. Try to reflect the supporting passage.

Be memorable. It will be no good if you and others can't remember and repeat it.

Be actionable. Help people gain confidence that they can experience this truth.

Record the finalized belief statements with one key supporting verse for each.

Example: *Generosity involves everyone. John 6:9*
